Seward High School will dismiss at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, September 15th for the annual Homecoming parade to the Elementary School.

Homecoming Dance

Parent-Teacher Conferences

The first round of parent/teacher conferences is scheduled for Tuesday, September 5th, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. Parent/Teacher conferences provide an excellent opportunity for you to meet your son and/or daughter's teachers, receive updates on their academic progress, and obtain other information that will help you to support your student in the journey through high school.

<u>Special Program the Night of Parent-Teacher</u> <u>Conferences: Senio Parent/Guardian Session with</u> <u>the Counselors (6:45-7:30 p.m.)</u>

A special program will be held for the parents/guardians of senior students the evening of parent/teacher conferences. Senior parents are strongly encouraged to attend. The presentation will start at 6:45 p.m. in the new theater and will last approximately 40 minutes. School staff will share information regarding post-high school admissions tests, NCAA/NAIA eligibility, scholarships, financial aid, and much more related to post-secondary options after high school. Don't miss this valuable opportunity!

NWEA Testing

NWEA testing will occur on September 7th for students in grades 9-10. Students will be tested in math, reading, science, and language usage. The results of these assessments will be used in two primary ways. The first is to help Seward High School staff understand the strengths and needs of individual students and groups of students within our school. This information will help guide instruction at the classroom level, more clearly define needs on a school-wide basis, and help the school identify which students might benefit from additional intervention and support. The second is to establish baseline student performance levels at the start of the school year. The baseline data will later be compared to spring NWEA performance to determine the effectiveness of our instructional efforts, interventions, and improvement initiatives throughout the year. In short, NWEA is an important tool in our plan to improve student learning at Seward High School. Please try to avoid scheduling appointments or other absences during the week of NWEA testing if possible.

NWEA/ACT Testing

While the 9th & 10th grades are taking the NWEA tests during their regular class schedule, the 11th grade students will be taking a practice ACT test and the 12th grade students will be attending regular classes.

Student/Parent NWEA and ACT Test Preparation Suggestions

- Charge the iPad the iPad will be used by most students to complete the NWEA test. Students will need a full charge this day.
- Dress comfortably.
- Get a good night of sleep two days before the test.

 During the exam schedule, sleep smart. A few days before an exam, get your seven-to-eight hours of sleep if you can. Sufficient sleep will help solidify memory for easy retrieval during the exam.
- Eat a well-rounded breakfast.
- Come to the test session with a positive attitude. This is your chance to show what you know and can do.

P.R.I.D.E. Positive Behavior Intervention and Support Program

What is P.R.I.D.E.?

P.R.I.D.E. is a school-wide reinforcement and acknowledgement system that provides immediate, intermittent, and long-term reinforcements, given by adults in the building, to any students displaying desired school-wide expectations, behaviors, or associated rules. Staff members nominate students for BlueJay P.R.I.D.E. awards during each term of the school year based upon behaviors they witness that go above and beyond our BlueJay P.R.I.D.E. expectations. Each term, positive behaviors will be recognized and honored during a P.R.I.D.E. Recognition Rally. These rallies feature alumni speakers, student performances, and special P.R.I.D.E. awards.

Why P.R.I.D.E.?

- Increases the likelihood that desired behaviors will be repeated
- Focuses staff and student attention on desired behaviors
- Fosters a positive school climate
- Reduces the need for engaging in time-consuming disciplinary measures

Components of our P.R.I.D.E. System

- Immediate/high frequency/predictable/tangible reinforcements and acknowledgements
- Delivered at a high rate for a short period while teaching new behaviors or responding to problem behaviors
- Names the behavior and ties the acknowledgement back to school-wide expectation upon delivery
- Brings "surprise" attention to certain behaviors or at scheduled intervals
- Maintains a taught behavior
- Celebrates/Acknowledges accomplishments of all kids and all adults
- Teaches appropriate behaviors the same way a child who doesn't know how to read learns to read--through instruction, practice, feedback, and encouragement.

PREPARATION

- Wear proper and acceptable attire to school.
- Arrive to school and to every class on time and be ready to work.
- Move to class when the warning bell rings at 8:10 a.m.
- Present a note signed by a parent/guardian phone call from parent/guardian to explain any absences.
- Advise the school office, guidance, and nurse regarding changes of address, phone number, and emergency information on a consistent basis.
- Keep backpacks in lockers.
- Carry materials needed for each class according to teacher expectations.
- Bring iPad charged and ready for use.

RESPECT

- Respect each other, and all property to ensure a positive and safe learning environment.
- Display appropriate behavior at all times.
- Use respectful, appropriate language. Avoid using sarcasm, gossip, belittling, or putting down of others.
- Place all trash and discarded materials in trash cans throughout the day.
- Move quietly through the building to avoid being a distraction to classrooms along the route.
- Display appropriate behaviors that will allow the bus driver to reach each destination safely.
- Take proper care of textbooks, materials, and equipment.
- Display good sportsmanship as a participate or as a spectator.

INTEGRITY

- Conduct themselves in a manner that allows the teachers to teach, and all students to learn.
- Remain on school property during school hours.
- Exit the building promptly at the ringing of the dismissal bell. Students involved in after school activities must report to that activity by 3:45 p.m., and remain under direct supervision of the staff while in the building.
- Cooperate with all school personnel.
- Do your own work and have pride in your work.
- Be honest.
- Know the rules and follow them.
- Compete with class and dignity.

DEDICATION

- Strive for success and believe it is possible.
- Set and meet goals.
- Turn in work on time and stay on task and topic.
- Be a lifelong learner.
- Be committed to being a BlueJay.

EFFORT

- Complete and turn in assignments on the due date.
- Return as quickly as possible whenever out of class in order to maximize learning.
- Be ready.
- Challenge yourself.
- Strive to be your best.
- Represent yourself, your parents, our school and your community in a positive way.



The Power of a Positive Team

Many think that you have to choose between positivity and winning. But the truth is you don't have to choose. Positivity leads to winning.

Michael Phelps was recently interviewed by Bob Costas where he described his approach to building a positive team before the 2016 Olympics in Rio.

"Every now and then you hear a bunch of negative comments or someone complaining and during training camp at one of the meetings I said to the guys that we are getting ready to go to the Olympics, this is what we have to do and if there is a negative comment keep it to yourself. The more positivity we have as a team the better off we are going to be. As soon as I said that we all became closer and then we really started getting going."

When I heard Michael say these words I was thrilled because he shared a truth with the world that I have witnessed countless times throughout the years. A team with talent can be good. But they must come together to be great. Positivity is the glue that enhances team connection and performance and it impacts office teams, school teams, church teams, and hospital teams as much as it does Olympic teams.

I've seen very positive teams with average talent accomplish more than anyone thought possible.

I've also seen negative teams with a lot of talent accomplish far less than everyone thought was possible.

Positive teams work together more effectively. They stay positive, connected, and committed through challenges. They maximize each other's talent. They believe together and achieve more together.

Positive, high performing teams don't happen by accident. They are built by leaders and team members who reduce the negative and add a big dose of positive. When you subtract negativity and add positivity to your talent, the sky is the limit.

The great news is that you don't have to be an Olympic champion with 28 medals to begin the process. You can be just like you and me. You can say enough with the negativity. Let's get positive. Let's get going.

Attendance

One of the most important characteristics leading to success in high school, college, or the workplace is good attendance. Research indicates that excessive tardiness or absenteeism can lead to lower academic achievement and a reduced likelihood to graduate. It is important for you to visit with your son and/or daughter about the importance of regular school attendance. We have several interventions and support services available, so please contact the school at 402-643-2988 if you feel that this may become an issue for your student.

Specific Seward Public Schools policies regarding student attendance can also be found at www.sewardschools.org. These policies are consistent with Nebraska state statutes 79-201 and 79-209. Outlined are definitions of excused and unexcused absences, interventions, resources, and potential consequences for excessive absenteeism or tardiness. Please take some time to review these policies if you have not already done so this school year.

Term 2 Schedule Changes

Students will be provided with an additional copy of their Term 2 schedule on Wednesday, September 20th. Student schedule change requests for Term 2 must occur by Friday, October 6th. A signup sheet for students to request a change is located outside of the counseling office doors. Counselors will meet with each of these students outside of instructional time prior to the start of the new term. The purpose of this process is to prevent interruption to classroom instruction that occurs when multiple schedule changes are made at the start of a new term.

After School Study Group

Students will have access to SHS Study Group on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday night of each week from 3:45-4:45 p.m. in the Seward High School library. Study Group will begin on September 4, 2017. Students will have access to Seward High School staff members as well as Concordia University students studying to become teachers. Students needing computer access are also welcome to attend.

Testing and College Application Fee Waivers

Students with economic need may qualify for fee waivers with the ACT, PSAT, AP exams, and college application fees if they meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Family receives public assistance
- Student is a ward of the state
- Student resides in a foster home
- Student is homeless
- Student participates in free or reduced-priced lunch program
- Family income is at or below the 2010 Bureau of Labor Statistics Low Standard Budget

Students may use up to two ACT waivers total junior and/or senior year. Any student who qualified for an ACT waiver also will qualify for application fee waivers when applying to college. Contact Mr. Fields or Ms. Baker for assistance.

<u>Sophomores and Freshmen - College Preparation</u> <u>Begins Now!</u>

College may seem far away for 9th and 10th grade students, but it's never too early to start preparing for that next step. Taking challenging academics and extracurricular opportunities are some of the best ways to work towards the college goal. The list below includes additional suggestions for parents and students as they start to think about this important transition.

- Meet with your counselor to discuss your college plans. Review your schedule to make sure you are enrolled in challenging classes that will help you prepare for college. Colleges prefer four years of English, social studies, math, science, and world language (Spanish at SHS).
- Start exploring to find out the required courses and tests of colleges that you may be interested in attending. Two helpful college search websites are: www.educationquest.org and www.collegeboard.com.
- Start a calendar with important dates and deadlines.
- Get more involved in activities inside and outside of school; there's something out there for everyone!
- Start documenting community service hours and experiences to include in future college and scholarship applications.
- Put forth your best effort. These assessments help guide your next steps from an academic and career interest standpoint.

It's important to remember that there are a variety of colleges: some are four-year, some two-year and even some one-year programs with a greater focus on a specific trade. By starting the process of thinking about those next steps now, you increase your chances of finding the best fit for you and your personal goals.

General Homework Tips for Parents

- Make sure your student has a quiet, well-lit place to do homework. Avoid having your child do homework with the television on or in places with other distractions, such as people coming and going.
- Help your student with time management. Establish a set time each day for doing homework. Don't let your student leave homework until just before bedtime. Think about using a weekend morning or afternoon for working on big projects, especially if the project involves getting together with classmates.
- **Be positive about homework.** Tell your student how important school is. The attitude you express about homework will be the attitude your student acquires.
- When your student asks for help, provide guidance, not answers. Giving answers means your student will not learn the material. Too much help teaches your student that when the going gets rough, someone will do the work for him or her.

- When the teacher asks that you play a role in homework, do it. Cooperate with the teacher. It shows your student that the school and home are a team. Follow the directions given by the teacher.
- If homework is meant to be done by your student alone, stay away. Too much parent involvement can prevent homework from having some positive effects. Homework is a great way for kids to develop independent, lifelong learning skills.
- Stay informed. Talk with your student's teacher. Make sure you know the purpose of homework and what your child's class rules are. Many staff at Seward High School have a classroom website, blog, or provide additional assignment information on PowerSchool. By accessing these resources you can provide an even greater level of support to your student.
- Help your student figure out what is hard homework and what is easy homework. Have your student do the hard work first. This will mean he will be most alert when facing the biggest challenges. Easy material will seem to go fast when fatigue begins to set in.

Generally speaking, most students at Seward High School will have some homework or studying to do outside of school hours on a daily basis. The amount will vary depending upon the specific courses they are enrolled in that particular term, grade level, and their ability to utilize time efficiently during the regular school day. Homework provides important practice to reinforce newly learned concepts. By maximizing these experiences, student learning will improve positively impacting a variety of school outcomes.
